Humility ... our #1 virtue.



Building a Path to Walsh 4.0

When we consider the history of Walsh University, the past can be divided into three phases, each with its unique challenges that have created opportunities for the future. With Walsh 1.0, the Brothers of Christian Instruction founded a Catholic liberal arts college for undergraduate men, taking an active role at Walsh during the early years. Walsh 2.0 signaled a transformation to a coed experience for commuter and residential students. Walsh's growth escalated during Walsh 3.0 as the college transformed into a University to meet a diverse set of traditional academic needs as well as a significant expansion in athletics. As we journey towards Walsh 4.0 we lay the groundwork for the strategic vision and innovation to not only survive but to thrive. Let's take a closer look.





Walsh 10

Walsh College opens on November 17, 1960, as the vision of its Founders, The Brothers of Christian Instruction, to provide access to higher education to the working class in the Midwest and develop a Christian house of intellect. Named in honor of Bishop Emmet Walsh of the Diocese of Youngstown, who gave a sizeable donation so that the college could build 'College Hall' (now Farrell Hall) and open after many setbacks and delays to a freshmen class of 67 gentleman students. Many in the freshmen class were from nearby Central Catholic High School, while others were recruited by the seven founding Brothers themselves from the East, where they had moved from and had many connections at the area high schools. During this early period, the Brothers not only served as college administrators but also faculty members. These initial years were focused on establishing the college's operations and laying the groundwork for its future growth.

Walsh 2.0

In 1969, Walsh College, now with its first residence hall, transitions to a coeducational institution and welcomes female students to live on campus. This pivotal moment coincided with Walsh also achieving its inaugural accreditation status with the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, as well as surpassing 1,000 students. The backdrop of this era was marked by significant civil and political unrest. In 1978, amidst this turbulent atmosphere, Brother Francis Blouin, F.I.C., a distinguished scholar and humanitarian, was appointed President. Over the ensuing decade, Brother Blouin brought five Nobel Peace Prize Laureates to campus to address various themes of faith and peace, thereby elevating Walsh's reputation. It was also a period of programmatic growth for Walsh College with the launching of the first graduate program, a Master of Arts in Counseling. During this time, our athletic offerings expanded with the construction of the physical education building, now known as the Cecchini Health & Wellness Complex, and the addition of a football program. This period of evolution culminated in 1993 when Walsh College attained official university status, signifying a new chapter in Walsh history.



Walsh 3.0

Throughout the late 1990s and early 2000s, Walsh University continued to undergo significant physical expansion, enhance its programs and attract a growing student body. President Richard Jusseaume spearheaded initiatives such as the commissioning of a prayer garden and the construction of Walsh's inaugural freestanding chapel, Our Lady of Perpetual Help, which opened its doors in 2006. During this era, Walsh also launched its first online program, an online MBA, and introduced its inaugural doctoral program, the Doctorate of Physical Therapy. Enrollment soared to an all-time high of 2,800 students, supported by the largest Capital Campaign in the University's history, which facilitated the completion of Walsh's landmark building, the Marlene and Joe Toot Global Learning Center. Furthermore, with the donation of Hoover Park on the north side of campus, the University expanded to encompass 136 acres and 27 buildings. Against the backdrop of shifting demographics and a saturated higher education landscape, the need for innovation was on the horizon.





Walsh 4.0

Rooted in the legacy of our founding Brothers, Walsh University propels forward under the leadership of President Tim Collins toward a new phase of development with future sustainability in mind. With a focus on strategic initiatives designed to meet the evolving needs of students and the workforce, foster cross enterprise alignment, enrich the student experience and expand academic offerings globally while cultivating partnerships to address the changing landscape of education and workforce demands, Walsh positions itself as an innovative leader in Catholic higher education which serves students as an Education Partner for Life.

Walsh Global offers students the chance to cultivate increased independence, cross-cultural understanding, and language proficiency while earning credits towards their degree.

Study Beyond initiatives facilitate experiential learning opportunities locally, nationally, and internationally, fostering global citizenship and leadership among students. Through strategic partnerships like those with Franciscan University of Steubenville and Carlow College St. Patrick's in Ireland, Walsh expands its reach and enriches students' academic journeys, reinforcing its commitment to providing transformative educational experiences aligned with its Catholic values.

The Skilled Technical Workforce Program is recognized by the National Science Board (NSB) as a leader in addressing the urgent need for STEM-capable workers, playing a pivotal role in shaping the emerging workforce and contributing to the regional tech-driven economy.

> The Cavs Cor Cordium, Latin for "heart of hearts," engages each student in a personal learning network, facilitating connections and learning, community-building, enhancing student involvement both on and off campus, fostering academic excellence and lifelong connections.

Walsh University embarks on a groundbreaking journey with the launch of **Alumni and Career Connections**, redefining the traditional career preparation model for graduates first career destination and beyond by harnessing the strength of alumni networks, employer engagements and community partnerships.

A dedicated **Center for Veteran Affairs** opens on campus staffed by a full-time Coordinator, demonstrating a steadfast commitment to supporting veterans and military members and providing vital resources for veteran and military students and their families.

Three new academic and community centers launch. The **Center for Academic** and **Professional Enrichment** and the **Center for Restorative Justice and Community Health** and the **Center for Sustainable Food Design.** These Centers offer formal pathways for engagement with faculty, staff, alumni, students, and the regional community, aiming to expand outreach and complement formal academics.

In the past year, Walsh University has made significant strides in reaffirming and fortifying its Catholic identity by developing a Statement of Faith and Understanding. This document stands as a testament to our commitment strengthening our institution's Catholic identity, aligning with the rich tradition of Catholic higher education. Furthermore, it encapsulates our dedication to upholding Catholic principles while fostering an environment that values reason, inquiry and inclusivity.

The pressing need to assert and defend our Catholic identity arises from the increasing threat to religious liberty faced by Catholic colleges and universities. Secular regulators, judges and legislators pose challenges that necessitate a proactive response. In line with the guidance from the Vatican, Catholic bishops, families, and educators, Walsh University recognizes the imperative to engage in self-evaluation and documentation to safeguard our religious mission.

The challenges confronting Catholic institutions underscore the importance of protecting religious liberty and maintaining institutional fidelity to Catholic principles. Legal experts emphasize the necessity of consistent adherence to religious tenets to uphold exemptions and navigate external pressures. Recent adverse rulings serve as reminders of the precarious position of Catholic institutions and the need for vigilant self-evaluation and compliance with Church law.

Walsh University, guided by the legacy of the Brothers of Christian Instruction (F.I.C.), operates within the context of the esteemed 935-year tradition of Catholic higher education. Our decision-making processes and policies are informed by the principles articulated in our Statement of Faith and Understanding. Through rigorous self-evaluation and unwavering commitment to our Catholic mission, we ensure the preservation and enhancement of our institution's identity and legacy.



Meeting Today's Campus Security Needs with Modern Equipment and Technology

Campus policing has evolved at Walsh University from a sparse security personnel presence in years past to a 24-hour patrol by the full service Campus Police Department that uses modern law enforcement techniques and equipment, and employs sworn officers, all of whom have prior experience. Chief of Police Ron Perdue joined Walsh in 2015 after a 24-year career with the Stark County Sheriff's Office. Captains Ron Springer* and Steve Miller also came from careers at the Stark County Sheriff's Office. Between the total staff including 23 full-time and part-time officers, Walsh University benefits from a combined 540 years of law enforcement experience. Their daily efforts touch every part of our academic community.

"The safety and security of the Walsh University community is our highest priority," said Chief Perdue. "With the backing of President Tim Collins and

the Cabinet, we are moving in the right direction in terms of securing the campus and having the tools in our toolbox to accomplish our goals of protecting our students, faculty, staff and guests."

Walsh University continuously addresses campus safety through programming, educational efforts, strategic partnerships, campus-wide threat assessments and technological advancements. Some of these new measures include the installation of surveillance cameras and lighting, swipe access and electronic locks across all academic buildings and residence halls, strategically placed signage and safety resources. The WU Alert system, which disseminates information quickly via text, phone and email, also has communication protocols for emergencies on campus, differentiating between timely warnings that provide advanced notice of potential threats and emergency notifications for imminent dangers requiring immediate action.

A significant stride in enhancing campus safety was achieved through the alignment of the Campus Police Department with the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) through the Ohio Law Enforcement Gateway. The utilization of NIBRS brings a heightened level of specificity to the reporting of offenses, allowing for the collection of more detailed crime-related information. This nuanced approach not only provides valuable context to specific crime issues but also affords greater analytic flexibility in interpreting the crime data collected. Leveraging this compliance, Walsh University is able to pursue federal and state grants. As a result, the University has secured funding for the Ohio MARCS (Multi-Agency Radio Communications System) under the auspices of the Nonprofit Security Grant Program. The radio system facilitates seamless communication with local, state, and federal agencies during emergencies, thereby bolstering the institution's preparedness and response capabilities. The University also secured the State of Ohio Body-Worn Camera Grant which has been instrumental in equipping the Campus Police Department with essential resources, including state-of-the-art body-worn cameras, docking stations, computers, monitors, cloud storage and training. This comprehensive package not only enhances the effectiveness of law enforcement on campus but also aligns with contemporary standards for transparency and accountability.



Cross-Enterprise Collaboration

While there are many similarities between campus and traditional policing, particularly in terms of officer safety, emergency preparedness, investigations and arrests, campus police officers have the added responsibility of working with other university departments to ensure everyone on campus takes an active role in campus safety. Their work now calls for wide-ranging expertise with a broader scope. Campus police conduct orientations for new employees, Resident Assistants, parents and first-year students and every athletic team, and "Run, Hide, Fight" trainings for students and employees. They also serve as the law enforcement arm of the Cav Safeguard Initiative, a campus-wide, cross-enterprise grant project funded by the Office on Violence Against Women through the U.S. Department of Justice. The project, led by Melanie Timco, Director of Prevention Education and Programming, uses a comprehensive approach to improving both the prevention of and response to dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking.

When necessary, the Campus Police Department partners with the Stark County Prosecutor's Office, COMPASS, Domestic Violence Project, Inc., the Stark County Domestic Violence Collaborative, Ohio Intimate Partner Violence Collaborative and the Alliance Area Domestic Violence Shelter.

Our Campus Police Department is incredibly fortunate to have strong, collaborative relationships with the broader community," *said Chief Perdue.* "We rely on these partnerships to develop impactful public safety strategies.

Campus police routinely engage in collaborative training sessions with various community law enforcement partners, such as the North Canton police and fire departments, Canton K-9 units, and the Stark County SWAT co-op.

"Participating in these joint trainings isn't just about building connections ... it's our way of saying, 'we're in this together' with external law enforcement agencies," Chief Perdue said. "Working hand-in-hand ensures we're all on the same page, ready to tackle any challenges that come our way. It's about contributing to the overall safety and security of both the campus and the surrounding community."

Alternative Approaches to Public Safety and Policing

Campus police prioritize training in alternative approaches to public safety and policing, including crisis intervention, restorative justice and community policing. Chief Perdue



and Captains Springer and Miller have each completed 40 hours of crisis intervention training and 12 hours of restorative justice training, which equips officers with proactive and community-oriented strategies to address conflicts and misconduct on campus.

Campus police are also involved with Walsh University's CARE team, a cross-enterprise threat assessment team, consistently evaluating and proactively managing potential risks.

"This is where red flags potentially come up. There are many things we can prevent, whether it's self-harm or harm to others. We are able to surround the student with all the community resources available to help resolve it," said Chief Perdue.

"Our commitment to building trust and enhancing the overall quality of life on campus means not only being visible in uniforms and marked police cars but also present and proactive," explained Captain Springer. "We strive to be guardians for our students, embodying an approach that transcends the traditional policing mindset. This involves actively participating in campus programs, engaging in open dialogues with students about their experiences, and fostering a sense of security through collaborative initiatives. By consistently being present and approachable, we aim to create an environment where students not only perceive us as protectors but also feel comfortable seeking assistance and building positive relationships with campus police officers." Walsh University's Proactive Stance Against Anti-Semitism Affirms Longstanding Solidarity with Jewish Community

In response to the escalating wave of anti-Semitism in the United States and the October 7 attack in Israel, Walsh University has taken a firm stance against discrimination. President Tim Collins joined fellow Catholic university presidents in signing a joint statement denouncing anti-Semitism, affirming the University's commitment to combatting bigotry and racism. President Collins has underscored the urgency of condemning global acts of terror and hatred against the Jewish people, reinforcing the University's deeply rooted Catholic conviction in advocating for the intrinsic dignity of all human beings. The joint statement against anti-Semitism, signed at the Franciscan University of Steubenville on October 24,

reflects Walsh University's collective dedication to combating discrimination and fostering a harmonious and inclusive environment.

The University's commitment to supporting the Jewish community was taken a step further by issuing direct admittance to Jewish students who are experiencing Anti-Semitism. The proactive measure is an extension of mission and an affirmation of a longstanding solidarity with the Jewish community. The expressed appreciation and gratitude from the Jewish community, including Walsh alumni, affirm the meaningful impact of the University's actions.

Acknowledging the concerns raised by Jewish students at various college campuses, Walsh University is dedicated to accelerating its transfer process for those facing discrimination or hostility. The provision of immediate support, encompassing expedited transfers, matching scholarships for the first semester, and assistance with housing, is aimed at facilitating a prompt and smooth transition for students affected by these challenges.

Walsh University's collaboration with the Jewish community is longstanding, evident in programs such as the Institute of Jewish Catholic Studies and The Wilkof Jewish Study Project. Actively fostering interfaith understanding through events like the Education for Life Colloquium, our University honors notable members of the Jewish community, including Holocaust survivor Barbara Turkeltaub and Nobel Laureate Elie Wiesel, for their unwavering dedication to social justice.



Strengthening our Ties to the Community through Partnerships and Beyond

Center for Veteran Affairs Supports Seamless Transition from Military to University Life for Students



The Center for Veteran Affairs, under the leadership of U.S. Marine Corps Veteran and Walsh alum Joshua Ruiz '21, has forged impactful partnerships over the past year, solidifying our position as a beacon for veteran support. Ruiz's commitment to growing the veteran

population on campus has been instrumental in achieving significant milestones. As a result, Walsh has already seen an increase in Veteran enrollment.

Proactively engaging with directors, marketing personnel, and managers across diverse organizations, Ruiz has initiated meetings, attended events, and facilitated discussions on potential partnerships locally, regionally and nationally. This strategic approach extends to education fairs, community service, and providing insights into Walsh's programming and has yielded notable success in veteran enrollment and general interest from that demographic. Ruiz, who has also collaborated with the University's admission and enrollment teams for undergraduate, degree completion and graduate programs, has spearheaded numerous initiatives and actively participated in nearly 20 veteran and military-driven events over the past year. This engagement not only showcases Walsh's commitment to the military community but also contributes to the growing interest and enrollment of veterans at Walsh.

Recognizing their sacrifices extend beyond the battlefield, we aim to create a welcoming, supportive environment, equipping them with the tools needed to invest in themselves and shape their future, said Ruiz,

who plays a crucial role in connecting veteran and military students with essential resources while also recruiting potential military students, developing programming for their success, and leading policy reviews for military-friendly changes. "In the short time I have been in this role, I have been able to create partnerships with local VA agencies and organizations that are immersed in the veteran community."



Walsh University proudly holds designations as a Top Ten Military Friendly[®] School, a member of the Yellow Ribbon Program, and it is designated a Collegiate Purple Star campus by the Ohio Department of Higher Education (ODHE) Chancellor Randy Garner. These recognitions underscore Walsh's commitment to creating an environment where service members and their families can flourish.







The Center for Veteran Affairs is currently embarking on a new and exciting phase, marked by the establishment of an onsite Veteran Resource Center. This specialized facility will serve as a focal point for collaboration, providing our military-related students with a dedicated workspace and lounge. Here, they can foster connections with fellow veterans and military members, creating a vibrant and supportive community within the academic environment.

Igniting Innovation and Workforce Development Through Strategic Partnerships




As the worldwide demand for STEM-capable workers continues to grow and becomes increasingly urgent, the National Science Board (NSB) published the Vision 2030 and the Blue-Collar STEM reports, detailing the need for an increase in strategic collaborations between government, industry, nonprofits,

and academia to produce more STEM workers. Walsh University heard the call and is playing a key role in providing transformational STEM opportunities for our students, our community and our country. Walsh's Skilled Technical Workforce Program (STWF), recognized by the NSB as being at the forefront of the national conversation and a leader among institutions of higher education in addressing the warnings sounded by the NSB, is actively shaping the emerging workforce and contributing to the regional and statewide tech-driven economy.

Aligned with national priorities and industry needs, Walsh has enrolled more than 70 companies in the STWF Program since its inception in 2020 and issued more than 1,500 technology-based credentials. Credential topics include Microsoft Office, Data Analytics, Internet of Things, Artificial Intelligence, Robotic Process Automation and Microsoft Office 365. Courses place an emphasis on relevant digital competencies which qualify Ohio employees for full tuition reimbursement for credentials earned under Ohio's TechCred Program.

While other education provider programs offer credentials in traditional, one-size-fits-all courses, the STWF Program is unique in that it tailors each program to each company's specific needs.





"Walsh's programs are designed and taught by industry professionals with expertise in specific areas that have partnered with the University," said Dr. Dan Passerini, Executive Director of Cross-Enterprise Operations. "Not only do our programs upskill participants with the knowledge they need to excel in the modern workplace, but we help companies adapt and advance a technology-driven culture within their organization which catalyzes productivity and innovation."

Walsh University, driven by its mission, secured a congressional appropriation grant in 2022 to expand the STWF Program. In February 2023, STWF began offering educational benefits to unemployed and under-represented local residents at no out-ofpocket cost to these individuals. Collaborating with organizations like Strengthening Stark and the Stark County Manufacturing Workforce Development Partnership, Walsh and their partners identify candidates seeking meaningful, long-term employment and enroll them in a professional development program. The program aims to enhance their technology competencies and foster essential workplace skills. With 204 enrollees to date, 111 have successfully earned credentials, and more than 30 have self-reported full-time employment for over 90 days-exceeding expectations and demonstrating significant progress toward sustainable employment.

The significance of these initiatives is amplified as the state of Ohio witnesses a surge in tech industry growth, with major global players like Intel, Facebook, Google, Amazon Web Services, IBM, and others expanding operations. At Walsh's 2023 Science and Technology Summit, Dr. Jonathan Gruber of MIT highlighted the potential of the Canton-Akron-Massillon corridor to become a "superstar city" for innovation and economic development. The collaboration between business, academia, and government is vital, a sentiment echoed by other distinguished speakers, including Dr. James Moore III of the National Science Foundation.

The Summit also marked another milestone for Walsh University, with Shimadzu Scientific Instruments awarding a second SPARQ grant, infusing millions of dollars into the University's Center for Scientific Excellence. This grant positions Walsh University as a key player in economic development opportunities through the sciences.

Meeting the Demand for Future Jobs

As technology and workforce needs evolve, higher education must ensure college graduates are not only prepared for their first job but equipped with the skills and knowledge that will help them throughout their lives. Research shows this new generation of students is going to change jobs 11 times before they retire, and we must prepare them for that by promoting the key ingredients of Catholic education that create men and women of character. Thus, Walsh University is not only preparing students for that first destination in their life but also their whole life's purpose. Building on the momentum created by the Brothers of Christian Instruction in 1960, and a goal of the Walsh 4.0 strategic plan, the University has experienced the largest increase in ten years in new areas of study with the strategic addition of several new academic programs for traditional and non-traditional students.

Master of Business Administration Program: Bridging the Leadership Gap in Education

With the imminent retirement of superintendents and other school district executives in the next five to ten years, Walsh University has taken a proactive approach to address the predicted leadership void. The specialized Master of Business Administration (MBA) program in School District Leadership is designed to prepare future administrators while improving succession and leadership planning.

The first cohort, in partnership with the Stark County Educational Service Center (ESC), has already enrolled nine students. The next cohort will begin summer of 2024. In addition to public-school districts, Walsh is in talks with Benedictine High School in Cleveland to recruit among Catholic school leadership.

What sets this program apart is its hybrid format, combining in-person sessions with online content, customized case

studies and more. The curriculum incorporates three courses from Walsh's master's in education program, along with an experiential learning co-op, to enhance the leadership skills of future public and private-school leaders. By merging best practices in business with K-12 educational best practices, the program not only prepares individuals for roles such as business managers and treasurers but also provides educational support for those on a pathway toward becoming a superintendent.

Post-Professional Doctor of Occupational Therapy Program Offered 100% Online

Walsh University has recently expanded its advanced online degree program offerings. As part of this expansion, the School of Behavioral and Health Sciences launched the Post-Professional Occupational Therapy Doctorate (PP-OTD) program, which comes with a unique advantage – no residency requirements.





The PP-OTD program is specifically designed for licensed occupational therapists who hold a bachelor's or master's degree. It offers a flexible learning experience that allows professionals to pursue academic studies while maintaining their employment. This program empowers occupational therapists to elevate their careers and assume leadership roles within the profession. Through critical thinking, collaboration cultural humility, and spirituality, students will develop the skills necessary to shape the future of occupational therapy. The program also provides many opportunities for career development and advancement.

Upon completion of the program, graduates will be equipped to contribute to the field through scholarship, teaching or integration. They will have the skills to design and implement innovative programs, advocate for equitable and inclusive communities, raise awareness for occupational therapy professionals and impact global health concerns.

Paving the Way for the Next Generation of Occupational Therapy Leaders

Walsh University is also laying the groundwork for an exciting addition to its academic offerings in the School of Behavioral and Health Sciences with the Entry-Level Occupational Therapy Doctorate (EL-OTD) program. With an expected launch in 2026, the program represents a strategic response to the evolving landscape of occupational therapy. Prospective students who look forward to a transformative educational experience that prepares them to lead, innovate and service in the field of occupational therapy will have the option to complete an EL-OTD degree in five graduate semesters that require 100 credits.

Academic-Business Collaboration Has Potential to Revolutionize Aviation Education



Walsh University, in collaboration with the FAA-approved American Winds College of Aeronautical Sciences, has recently restructured its aviation program to better serve students aspiring to become professional pilots. The new Bachelor of Science in Professional Aviation 2+2 offers a streamlined pathway for students to earn a bachelor's degree from Walsh University while simultaneously building flight hours and obtaining an associate degree in Aeronautical Science from American Winds College of Aeronautical Sciences. This innovative program has the potential to revolutionize aviation education and address the ongoing pilot shortage while benefiting students.

The key benefits of this academic program include:

Reduced Flight Hours and Costs: The 2+2 program allows students to complete the Private Pilot course within a few months, followed by the Instrumental Rating course, significantly reducing the time and financial investment needed to obtain their pilot's license.

Seamless Process: Students can register for their major courses at Walsh University while simultaneously beginning their flight training with American Winds. This integrated approach ensures a smooth transition between academic studies and practical flight experience. **Competitive Advantage:** Walsh University's Bachelor of Science in Professional Aviation combines psychology, business, professional development, and aviation courses, providing graduates with a well-rounded skill set that gives them a competitive edge in the aviation industry.

Furthermore, Walsh University is actively working with the airline industry to develop cadet programs, co-ops and other benefits for aviation graduates. This strategic collaboration aims to address the growing shortage of commercial pilots and opens many career opportunities for program graduates.





Master of Exercise Science Offered in Thriving Field of Study

Exercise Science has quickly become one of Walsh University's most popular majors and we are thrilled to offer a range of programs that cater to the growing demand in this field. Our exercise science degree provides a solid foundation in human anatomy and physiology, biology, chemistry, exercise physiology and research practices. Thus, opening various career opportunities in physical therapy, occupational therapy, athletic training, coaching and other fields of clinical practice.

Additionally, we are excited to introduce the online Master of Science in Exercise Physiology program, which prepares new graduates and working fitness professionals to perform at a higher level in their profession. This program offers a more comprehensive understanding of the human body and its response to exercise, and includes business skills, preparing students for careers as health and fitness managers and team leaders, strength and conditioning specialists with advanced knowledge and skills, or clinical physiologists seeking advancement. Graduates can pursue fulfilling careers in research, clinical settings, and sports performance, making a broader positive impact on the health and well-being of individuals touched by their organization. To ensure the success of these programs, we have consulted with our MBA (Master of Business Administration) colleagues, and we are considering the landscape of online courses and the needs of adult learners. Our curriculum is designed to provide graduates with both scientific and business acumen, giving them a competitive edge in the job market. The program launch date is tentatively set for Fall 2024.



Partnership in Vietnam to Offer Walsh Bachelor of Business Administration

Business majors in Vietnam will be able to enroll soon in a new collaborative Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) offered in Vietnam as a Walsh University degree. Partnering with Dai Nam University in Hanoi, this program is expected to be approved by the MOET (Vietnamese equivalent to ODHE, HLC) and to potentially start as soon as Summer 2024, but certainly by Fall 2024. Walsh University faculty and Dai Nam University faculty will each teach about 50% of the curriculum on ground in Vietnam. The program will serve as a model for other similar partnerships in the future.

Post-Master's Doctor of Nursing Practice in Reproductive Health

Leveraging a strategic partnership with Reproductive Health Medicine (RHMG) led by Dr. Nicholas Kongoasa, based in Atlanta, Georgia, and Birmingham, Alabama, Walsh University will offer a unique new track to help our graduate nurses focus on a Catholic perspective with women's reproductive health. Students

in the PM DNP Reproductive Health degree program will complete 27 credit hours that are already developed and part of the BSN-DNP and PM DNP Leadership programs. The specialty specific course work will include 9 credit hours of residency practicum that will be developed by Walsh nursing faculty in collaboration with RHMG medical providers. Six additional specialty specific credits are established courses through Fertility Education and Medical Management (FEMM) and Fertility Appreciation Collaborative to Teach the Science (FACTS). FEMM and FACTS are national and international organizations that teach medical providers, students, and other healthcare professions about natural or fertility methods of family planning (FACTS) and how a women's monthly cycle affects overall health (FEMM). Upon completion of the FEMM coursework, students will be FEMM certified medical providers. The entire program will consist of 41 credit hours which can be completed, full-time, within 2 years (6 semesters). Students are expected to start enrolling in Fall 2024.

Additionally, there has been a concerted effort to upgrade existing programs in physical therapy, counseling and human development, exercise science, chemistry, general education and others in the spirit of continuous improvement and serving the needs of modern students.

Walsh University's Blouin Scholars Serve as a Beacon of Leadership to Serve Society

For more than a decade, the Blouin Scholars have been making impactful contributions to our community while simultaneously providing an immersive and transformative educational and experiential opportunity for the students. Selected as interdisciplinary teams of iustice-oriented students who demonstrate our mission-aligned qualities as incoming freshmen, they are charged to address local and global issues through service and experiential scholarship as an extension of their academic pursuits. Each scholar works strategically with peers, faculty advisors, and topic experts to make positive impacts on a particular community issue while earning their degree. Blouin Scholars receive an annual scholarship and are provided domestic and international field study opportunities.

From day one as freshmen, Blouin Scholars and their advisors embark on a profound exploration of the greatest challenges facing the world, delving into the complexities of social justice issues, in seamless collaboration with our extensive network of community partners for the betterment of our local and global society,

said Blouin Scholars Faculty Director Dr. Nick Morris.

Blouin Scholars Class of 2024: Applying Food, Hunger and Sustainability Learnings to Real-World Applications Locally and Abroad

The Blouin Scholars Class of 2024 has been making significant strides in addressing food, hunger, and sustainability locally and across the globe, by examining these issues from an academic perspective as well as the Catholic world view. Through a comprehensive curriculum and hands-on experiences, these scholars have developed a deep understanding of the challenges and potential solutions in these critical areas.

During their freshman year, the 2024 cohort delved into the autobiography of Brother Frances Blouin, gaining valuable insights into his journey and the importance of addressing social justice issues. They also organized a campus food drive, collecting donations that were then generously given to the



Stark County Hunger Task Force. Additionally, the scholars were introduced to the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals and systems thinking, broadening their understanding of the interconnectedness of these issues.

Their second year, they participated in advocacy training with students from across the country and the Alliance to End Hunger. The scholars also took part in a poverty simulation, gaining firsthand experience and empathy for those facing food insecurity. Creativity and design thinking were explored in a cohort course that integrated experiences in Nashville, Tennessee, where the scholars investigated various aspects of food, hunger, and sustainability through site visits and volunteering. Their efforts included working with the

> Second Harvest Food Bank, volunteering at an organic farm, and meeting with an urban design firm.

Being a leader in service has been one of the most fulfilling journeys of my life. I have become a changemaker in my community and beyond," she said. "I have traveled domestically, to Nashville, Tennessee, to work with food banks to learn better, sustainable ways of feeding communities, and internationally, to London, England, to measure carbon footprint and make recommendations on how the Portsmouth Diocese can become carbon neutral.

Hunger Task Force, StarkFresh and the McKinley Presidential Library and Museum. They also delved into the Poverty Report on Stark County, further deepening their understanding of the challenges faced by their community.

To gain a global perspective, the scholars studied Laudato Si, exploring the Catholic Church's position on sustainability and developed skills in data collection, analysis and visualization. In the summer of 2023, the Blouin Scholars embarked on a journey to England. While in London, they explored cultural differences relating to food, hunger, and sustainability by visiting a local food bank, volunteering at a park to help sustainably "Reclaim the Riverside" and met with Historic England to learn about sustainable renovations for listed buildings. They traveled to Oxford to meet the representatives from the Laudato Si Research Institute before embarking on their signature project, to calculate the carbon footprint for the dioceses of Northampton, Birmingham, Clifton and Portsmouth. This initiative is in collaboration with the Guardians of Creation project at St. Mary's University in Twickenham. This hands-on experience allowed them to apply their knowledge and make tangible contributions toward sustainability efforts. In the fall, they submitted and adapted their carbon footprint presentations to the Diocese of Youngstown Office of Peace and Justice.

This spring, the cohort is reflecting on their four years of Blouin Scholarship and crafting their own personal narrative for career and graduate school success.

Blouin Scholars Class of 2025: Advancing Community-Engaged Learning in Human Exploitation, Trafficking and Response

Advisors: Dr. Michelle Lenarz and Professor Zana Zawahri

The Blouin Scholars Class of 2025 has made significant strides in their mission to combat human exploitation and trafficking. Over the past two years, these dedicated students have immersed themselves in academic learning



organizations such as the Canton YWCA, COMPASS Sexual Assault Education, Prevention & Support, Hartville Migrant Ministries, and Our Lady of Peace Elementary School, all of which play a crucial role in responding to these pressing issues. The students also completed service-learning projects with Canton City Public Health, Immigrant Workers Projects, Stark Blessing Box Initiative, Stark Fresh and Stark Metropolitan Housing Authority.

In Spring 2023, the cohort participated in an overnight retreat at Lighthouse Ministries, where they took part in panel discussions on redlining in Southeast Canton and the community's response to human exploitation, engaging community partners Habitat for Humanity and Refuge of Hope. Additionally, the students

conducted a thorough windshield survey of five zip codes in Canton, assessing the availability and quality of resources in the area.

They embarked on a road trip in May 2023, focusing on civil rights, the abolitionist movement and modern-day slavery. They visited renowned museums such as the Underground Railroad Museum and Freedom Center in Cincinnati, Ohio, the Rosa Parks Bus Boycott Museum at Troy University in Montgomery, Alabama, and the Whitney Plantation in Edgar, Louisiana. The cohort also collaborated with local outreach organizations, including Eden House and Giving Hope NOLA, to gain a deep understanding of the fight against human trafficking and exploitation. Building on their experiences, the Blouin Scholars presented four thought-provoking posters at the Academic Celebration of Excellence Symposium (ACES) in Fall 2023. These posters highlighted the importance of addressing vulnerability in populations, fostering a strong cohort community, engaging with the community through service and utilizing effective storytelling to raise awareness.

Also, in Fall 2023, the cohort conducted a research opinion survey on human trafficking, with the aim of creating an educational artifact for the campus community. The cohort began partnering with the local anti-human trafficking organization Not For Sale their freshman year, initially participating in logistics and working their way up to assisting with research and marketing their annual Community Freedom Summit held at Walsh University. This led to the establishment of the student-run Cavs Coalition against human trafficking.

Looking ahead, the Blouin Scholar cohort will travel to Carlow College St. Patrick's in June 2024 to learn from their work in supporting vulnerable populations in Ireland and to share knowledge and experiences from the Blouin Scholar perspective. The students hope to bring similar resources and strategies back to their own community.

Blouin Scholars Class of 2026: Contributing to a Brighter Future for Stark County Through Housing and Neighborhood Development

The Blouin Scholars Class of 2026 has dedicated their academic journey to exploring infrastructure and human flourishing, with a specific emphasis on housing and neighborhood development. This focus aims to seamlessly integrate academic pursuits with substantial contributions to the overall well-being of the Stark County community.

During their freshman year, they actively engaged with knowledgeable speakers, including former Walsh University faculty members Larry and Penny Bove, who delved into topics such as Brother Francis Blouin's legacy, Walsh's mission and the history of the Brothers of Christian Instruction. Serena Draper Hendershot '17, from the Canton Community

and community engagement, gaining valuable insights into the factors that contribute to vulnerability in Stark County.

Through their studies, the Blouin Scholars have delved into various aspects of education, economics, income, poverty rates and health factors in the local community. This comprehensive understanding has allowed them to explore





Health Department shared her expertise on the intersection of infrastructure and public health, while Bob Gessner from The Stark Community Foundation added depth to their discussions by exploring the issue of broadband access in Stark County. Field experiences at SARTA, Nimisilla Park and StarkFresh enhanced their perspectives.

The cohort's journey involved a comprehensive exploration of the 2020 report titled "Protecting Stark's Future: A Call to Coordinate Child Poverty Strategies," developed by The Stark Community Foundation and the United Way of Stark County which explored fostering positive transformation, promoting ongoing dialogue, and exploring innovative approaches to tackle this pressing issue.

In Spring 2023, the Blouin Scholars hosted speakers from ICAN Housing, including Walsh alumna Julie Sparks '89, as well as speakers from Habitat for Humanity East Central Ohio and Canton for All People. As part of their immersive experience, the cohort visited Lighthouse Ministries in Southeast Canton, engaging in a service project while gaining insights into the historical and economic factors influencing poverty and resources in Canton neighborhoods. Additionally, the scholars visited the site of the community center on Gonder Ave. in Southeast Canton, where Canton for All People is developing facilities, including a health center and a grocery store, contributing to their understanding of community development initiatives in the region.

This past fall, they explored the operations of Habitat for Humanity East Central Ohio, ICAN Housing offices in Canton, where they participated in a service project, and returned to the Canton for All People project to explore the ongoing progress in the Shorb neighborhood – a house rehabilitation and a community grocery store.

To enhance their collaborative efforts, the scholars divided into four teams, each assigned to work closely with a different community partner across the socio-economic spectrum. These teams actively engaged with their respective partners during the spring terms, fostering meaningful contributions to community development initiatives.



Blouin Scholar Class of 2027: Explores Poverty and School Performance

The Blouin Scholar Class of 2027 is one of the most diverse including international students from Ghana and India.

Their freshman year has been focused on their exploration of poverty and its impact on school performance. Beginning day one, these dedicated students have delved into the



concepts of cultural humility and the true meaning of poverty. Guided by selected sections from Dr. James Knight's book, "Heart: A Journey Toward Cultural Humility," the students have gained valuable insights into how these principles can be applied within a Blouin Scholar perspective.

Looking ahead to the spring semester, the focus will shift toward understanding how poverty affects students at various levels within the school environment. The cohort will examine the impact of poverty on families, schools, and districts, and explore the existing interventions in these contexts. They'll work with community partners representing county services, nonprofit organizations, school districts, individual schools and early childhood services. The ultimate goal is to develop research questions that will help the community address any gaps in serving their stakeholders.

By the end of their first year, the cohort aims to narrow down their areas of interest for further exploration in the fall. Through their exploration of poverty and its impact on school performance, the cohort is gaining a deeper understanding of the challenges faced by students from disadvantaged backgrounds. By addressing these challenges head-on, the Blouin Scholar Program aims to create a more equitable and inclusive educational environment for all. As all of the Blouin Scholar cohorts progress in their transformative journey, their interdisciplinary approach and collaboration with community partners showcase the program's enduring impact on local and global issues, standing as a testament to the institution's commitment to developing justice-oriented leaders dedicated to service and experiential scholarship.





Finding Confidence and Success Through Campus Involvement

Leah DiMichele, a Professional Writing major, may not have been the most loguacious student at Walsh University, but she will always appreciate that her professors and advisors took an interest in her learning and encouraged her to get involved on campus. International Student's Nursing Aspirations Soar at Walsh University

Each year, Walsh University welcomes international students from dozens of different countries. Before they can begin their academic pursuit in the United States, they apply for a student visa and wait for it to be approved. Along with the uncertainty of knowing when they will begin their freshman year, they often feel apprehensive about living abroad. Gloria Tindana traveled about 5,000 miles from Ghana, a country in West Africa, to study nursing in The Byers School of Nursing, a noble profession she has wanted to pursue since she was a young girl. She found Walsh's program to be among the ten best nursing schools in Ohio. Walsh University's commitment to academic excellence extends beyond its campus borders, welcoming some of the world's brightest minds as research collaborators, visiting professors and guest lecturers. This approach not only enriches the learning experience for students but also provides unique opportunities for faculty members to grow professionally, tackle complex problems and expand their teaching and research horizons with new perspectives.



Following his recent role as moderator for the U.S. National Security Policy Panel with World Leaders, Walsh's 2023 Presidential Thought Leadership Series, renowned philosopher and former national security advisor, Dr. Joe Wood, brought his expertise from the global stage to the classroom this

past year, serving as a visiting professor of philosophy. His courses, Introduction to Philosophy and Catholic Belief and Practice, offered students a unique opportunity to engage with his wealth of knowledge firsthand.

There is a real sense of mission here at Walsh that is bigger than all of us as individuals, *Dr. Joe Wood said*.

"Walsh can take students from the local area or from 39 different nations and can give them the skills to have a good life, whether that is making a living, which is a good part of it, but also with some parts of the curriculum, to ask the questions that matter even more than how am I going to make a living. What is a fulfilling life? What defines humanity? What is it to really be able to help the people around me? Walsh seems to me, at least, to be focused on those questions, trying to build whole people and give them the start to have a successful life."

Having served as National Security Advisor and Chief of Staff for Vice President Dick Cheney from 2005 to 2009, Dr. Wood's insights into global affairs are unparalleled. He holds a Bachelor of Science from the U.S. Air Force Academy, a Master's in Public Administration from Harvard's Kennedy School of Government and a Ph.D. from the School of Philosophy at the Catholic University of America, among other notable credentials. "I think it's important for everyone to try to understand very difficult issues in a very complex world if we're going to be able to govern ourselves," said Dr. Wood.



"Be not afraid," those were the words of Pope John Paul II. Be not afraid of doing what's right and finding what's right for you."

As Walsh continues to foster collaborations with scholars of Dr. Wood's caliber, students and faculty alike can look forward to engaging with diverse perspectives and tackling complex issues in the classroom and beyond.
